Thank you for your continued support of and interest in Butte College.

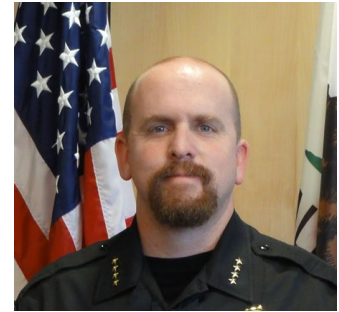

The College Police Officers have peace officer authority pursuant to Penal Code 830.32 and Education Code 72330. The College Police Department is responsible for law enforcement and all emergency responses on campus. It is also responsible for providing support services tailored to meet the needs of the campus community. Our department strives to provide a sensitive, measured approach to all situations requiring police assistance, while still maintaining the autonomy of the College.

No college can be risk free in this society. We encourage all Butte College members to work together in cooperation to create an atmosphere that is safe and conducive to learning. All campus members are encouraged to immediately report any suspicious or unlawful activity on campus to the College Police Department. You can contact the College Police Department 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

About Butte College

Butte College, established in 1968, is 70 minutes north of Sacramento in the Sierra Nevada foothills with educational facilities in the cities of Chico and Orland. The main campus is a designated wildlife refuge, on 928 acres, which makes Butte College one of the largest community college campuses in California serving 14,000 students.

Butte College maintains 3 off-campus centers. Two are located in the City of Chico and the other is in the City of Orland. The Butte College Police Department provides primary law enforcement and emergency response coverage for the Chico Center and Skyway Center. General Law enforcement for the Orland Center is provided by the Orland Police Department. Any criminal activity or any other emergencies occurring in the Orland Center should immediately be reported to the local police department and center staff.

Butte College offers general, transfer education, career and technical skills preparation classes ranging from fire, law enforcement academies to agriculture, welding, automotive technology and fully-equipped science and nursing academic laboratories.

There are no dormitories on Butte College owned property and all students live off campus.

Law Enforcement/College Police

Confidential Reporting Procedures

Crimes can be reported on a confidential basis for inclusion in the Annual Security Report. If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the district/college system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. The Police Department can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the district/college can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, employees, and visitors; determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant; and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the institution.

District/College Police Support

The Butte College Police Department maintains a working relationship with local, county, city and state law enforcement agencies. Butte College Police Department participates in the Butte County Interagency Narcotics Task Force and the Butte County Gang Task Force.

Policy on Timely Warning Notices

As an effort to provide timely notice to the Butte College community in the event of a serious incident, which may pose an ongoing threat to members of the Butte College community, a timely warning would be distributed to the campus community. As circumstances allow, the decision to distribute a timely warning notice will be based on the judgment of the Butte College Police, President or Designee. Any of the following may be used to issue immediate warnings about serious emergencies on campus: emergency text message alerts, prominent postings on the Butte College website, broadcast email and voicemail, and public address systems. Fliers and other informational materials may also be posted in other campus buildings to inform students, faculty, and staff of ongoing safety concerns.

In the event that a situation arises either on or off campus that, in the judgment of the Butte College Police Chief or College Administration, constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus wide timely warning will be issued.

Decisions to make timely warnings will be made on a case-by-case basis in light of all the facts surrounding a crime or other emergency situation. A warning may be issued through any or all of the following means of the Butte College Emergency Notification System:

- Email
- Text message
- Phone call, and/or
- Campus broadcasts

This will be the only gate that will be unlocked after hours. A contact number is posted on the inside and outside of the gate.

Local Law Enforcement

Reference: California Education Code Section 67381

Each college or center of the District shall enter into a written agreement with local law enforcement agencies. The agreement shall clarify operational responsibilities for investigations of Part I violent crimes, defined by law as willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault, occurring at each location.

The written agreement shall designate which law enforcement agency shall have operational responsibility for violent crimes and delineate the specific geographical boundaries of each agency's operational responsibility, including maps as necessary.

The written agreements required by this policy shall be public records and shall be made available for inspection by members of the public upon request.

Butte College Police Education and Prevention

Butte College Police encourages members of the community to assist in preventing crime by minimizing opportunities to become a victim by using good judgment and safety practices and by encouraging students and employees to be responsible for their own and others' security. During 2014, District Police/Security presented 20 courses and 15 hours of educational programs on either a comprehensive crime prevention topic or a safety area to district groups. Of those 15 hours, 1 hour of education contained a sexual assault component presented to 3200 attendees. Butte College Safe Place presents a comprehensive sexual assault component to all new students during Orientation and provides specialized training to student athletes. The District Police provided education and crime prevention information to approximately 3200 students and parents at Orientation and New Student Welcome Days.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

The Butte College Police Department maintains an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) that contains provisions to provide immediate emergency response and evacuation in an emergency situation. This plan provides that if there is an immediate threat to the health and safety of students or employees, occurring on campus, the Police Department, Office of Emergency Management and Planning; District/College Office of Emergency Services Disaster Agency; Environmental Health and Safety; the District/College Public Relations; and the Office of the President/Chancellor may, in due consideration of the prevailing circumstances, follow aspects of the EOP notification procedures.

The EOP also implements the Emergency Response Electronic Communications Procedure, which allows for the immediate notification of the campus community upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or staff occurring on campus. The Police/Security Department, County OES and/or CalEMA conduct an annual exercise of the Emergency Operations Plan and document such exercise. Additionally, the District/College Emergency Guide is published and distributed annually and provides emergency response and evacuation procedures for each building on campus.

BOARD POLICY**

BP 3505 – Emergency Response Plan

References: Education Code Sections 35294.2, 32282, 35296, and 42140;

Homeland Security Act of 2002;

Government Code Sections 3100 and 8607(a);

National Fire Protection Association 1600;

Homeland Security Presidential Directive-5; Executive Order S-2-05; 19

California Code of Regulations (CCR) Sections 2400-2450

The Superintendent/President shall establish procedures and a Disaster Preparedness Plan for the District to be activated in the event of an emergency, or when a natural disaster or hazardous condition occurs. The Disaster Preparedness Plan shall comply with the National Incident Management System (NIMS), the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) and incorporate the functions and principles of the Incident Command System (ICS). The Disaster Preparedness Plan shall also incorporate NIMS and SEMS to facilitate the coordination between and among agencies in the event of an emergency or natural disaster.

The District will implement a series of ongoing training sessions, based on job titles or assigned roles within the emergency management program, for District personnel that are in compliance with NIMS and SEMS guidelines. District personnel will be informed that as public employees, they are also disaster service workers during national, state and local emergencies.

The Superintendent/President will establish a Crisis Response Team to carry out compliance with NIMS and SEMS mandates.

The Disaster Preparedness Plan shall contain information regarding activation and chain of command responsibilities. The District will maintain compliance with NIMS mandates that require planning and incorporation for all phases of emergency management including mitigation and prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery.

The Superintendent/President will communicate in a timely manner, and as necessary and practical, with the Board President during an emergency. Board members will make themselves available in the event an emergency Board meeting is necessary.

The Butte College Emergency Response Plan shall serve as the Administrative Procedures for this policy.

Safety of Buildings and Grounds

The Butte College buildings are monitored and patrolled by Butte College Police Department. The Butte College Police Department regularly patrols campus and reports malfunctioning lights and other unsafe physical conditions to the Facilities Planning and Management for correction.

Facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Campus lighting typically meets or exceeds the industry standard for pedestrian walkways. Shrubbery and other vegetation are kept trimmed to avoid obstructing visibility. Parking lots throughout campus are well lit and routinely patrolled by Butte College Police Officers. In addition, the parking lots are equipped with a communication system that is connected to the Butte College Police office. Other members of the Butte College community are helpful when they report equipment problems to Butte College Police or to Butte College Facilities Management. Possession and use of weapons are prohibited on the Butte College campus.

Fire Safety Report

Fire Safety Disclosures: Butte College does not have any housing facilities.

Missing Student Alert

If a member of the Butte College community believes that a student is missing, they should immediately notify the Butte College Police Department by calling 895-2351.

Butte College Police will investigate, generate a missing person report, enter relevant student data into an appropriate database and involve other law enforcement agencies as necessary. The missing student protocol will be activated within 24 hours of the determination the student is missing. The Butte College Police Department will notify the person identified by the student as the “missing person contact.” Only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers may have access to this information. If the missing student is under 18 years of age and is not an emancipated individual, the Butte College Police Department will notify the student’s parent or legal guardian that the student is considered missing. In the event the student has not registered a contact person, law enforcement will be notified that the student is missing and proceed with the investigation.

Campus Security for Non-Campus Locations

Butte College Police Department Officers monitor and record criminal activity at non-campus locations and may work cooperatively with local law enforcement and the Office of Student Services to address problems as they arise.

Campus Security for Satellite Locations and Occasional Instruction Sites

Butte College has three satellite learning centers: Chico Center, Skyway Center and the Glenn County Center. In addition to these three sites, Butte College Cosmetology located in the city of Chico, focuses on Cosmetology education. Butte College Police Department will respond to and service these sites and local police will patrol the surrounding vicinities.



Butte College Safe Place and Wellness program

As part of its commitment to provide a safe and secure campus, Butte College Police Department supports the Butte College Safe Place, a service that encourages and responds to the reporting of any sexual assaults, domestic violence, and stalking both on and off campus. Safe Place offer's a visible support system for victims of sexual assault, intimate partner violence, and stalking through outreach, crisis intervention, advocacy, and educational programming at Butte College. <http://www.butte.edu/safeplace/>

Advocacy Services

- California State Certified Advocates and Peer Counselors are available to provide crisis intervention and serve victims and survivors of sexual assault, intimate partner violence and stalking.
- Referrals to campus and community resources. Accompany victim to court, medical exams, law enforcement and student judicial affairs reporting.
- Act as a liaison between campus member and faculty/staff and service providers. Follow up case management services to support the individual in accessing services and support.

Educational Programming

- Provide outreach and awareness activities to students, staff, and faculty on campus deliver prevention education presentations on the dynamics of sexual assault, intimate partner violence, and stalking.
- Provide training for area professionals on dynamics of sexual assault, stalking and intimate partner violence crimes upon request.

If a victim selects a professional counselor, the Butte College Police Department's policy is to empower counselors to inform the victim of how to report the incident voluntarily and confidentially for inclusion in the annual security report statistics.

Safety Escort Service

The Butte College Police patrol the campus and if requested, escort students and staff 7 days a week.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG POLICIES

Alcoholic Beverages

The possession, sale, or furnishing of alcohol on Butte College campus property is governed by Butte College Standards of Conduct Board Policy 5500 and California state laws. Violators are subject to disciplinary action and criminal prosecution. Butte College prohibits the possession of open containers of alcoholic beverages on Butte College premises.

Butte College policy states: Unlawful possession, use, sale, offer to sell, or furnishing, or being under the influence of, any controlled substance listed in Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 11053) of Division 10 of the California Health and Safety Code, an alcoholic beverage, or an intoxicant of any kind; or unlawful possession of, or offering, arranging or negotiating the sale of any drug paraphernalia, as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 11014.5.

Butte College is a drug-free and alcohol-free workplace.

Education and Prevention

College Police trainings: New student orientation, new employee orientation and ongoing staff workshops.

SEXUAL ASSAULT POLICIES

The Butte College Police Department advises victims of sexual assault to:

- 1) Contact police as quickly as possible
- 2) Preserve evidence
- 3) Seek medical care

Incidents of sexual assault should be reported to the Butte College Police immediately. Additional details are available on the Butte College Police website. The Butte College Policy Statement on Sexual Assault located on the Butte College website at: <http://www.butte.edu/fpm/collegepolice/>.

Campus Policies and Procedures proclaim Butte College Students, faculty and staff who may be victims of sexual and other assaults shall be treated with dignity and provided comprehensive assistance. The Butte College and Title IX complaint procedure includes students' options for notifying on-campus and local police and a statement that the institution will comply with a student's request for assistance in notifying authorities and confidential reporting. Butte College provides support for victims of sexual assault. Butte College will change the victim's academic schedule if changes are requested, appropriate to the situation, and reasonably available. The procedure states the accuser, and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding, and the accuser and accused shall be informed of the outcome of any institutional disciplinary proceeding alleging a sex offense. Sanctions available to be imposed through

Butte College judicial proceedings, after a finding of guilt, range from a reprimand to expulsion from Butte College.

Education and Prevention

- Safe Place trainings: Sexual assault educational programs include workshops for orientation for new students and staff, yearly law enforcement training workshops, ongoing staff presentations, posters and fliers posted in Butte College buildings.
- College Police trainings: New student orientation, new employee orientation and ongoing staff workshops.

THE FEDERAL CAMPUS SEX CRIMES PREVENTION ACT

The Federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act requires Butte College to inform the campus community where to find information on registered sex offenders. California law requires sex offenders to register with their local police or sheriff, which places their names in a state-wide database. CRIME STATISTICS

The crime statistics were compiled by the Butte College Police Department, campus officials having responsibility for oversight of student activities, and relevant local agencies. Crime definitions are from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Handbook and sex offense definitions are from the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. For statistical purposes, crime statistics reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported.

All of the statistics are gathered, compiled, and reported to the Butte College community via this report. This information is available at the Butte College Police website at <http://www.butte.edu/fpm/collegepolice/>. The Butte College Police authorities submit the annual crime statistics published in this report to the United States Department of Education (DOE). The statistical information gathered by the United States Department of Education is available to the public through the DOE website.

DEFINITIONS OF CLERY ACT CRIMES

(Crime Definitions from the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook and Sex Offenses Definitions from the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program)

Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter: the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. NOTE: Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded.

Negligent Manslaughter: the killing of another person through gross negligence.

Sex Offenses–Forcible: Any sexual act directed against another person, without consent of the victim including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

A. Forcible Rape

The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

B. Forcible Sodomy

Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

C. Sexual Assault with an Object

The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

D. Forcible Fondling

The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Sex Offenses–Non-forcible: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

A. Incest

Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

B. Statutory Rape

Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Dating Violence: Is violence by a person who has been in a romantic or intimate relationship with the victim. Whether there was such relationship will be gauged by its length, type, and frequency of interaction.

Domestic Violence: Includes asserted violent misdemeanor and felony offenses committed by the victim's current or former spouse, current or former cohabitant, person similarly situated under domestic or family violence law, or anyone else protected under domestic or family violence law.

Stalking: Is a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for her, his, or others' safety, or to suffer substantial emotional distress.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned – including joy riding).

Arson: The willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another kind.

Liquor Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Drug Abuse Violations: Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Weapon Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

HATE CRIMES DEFINITIONS

Hate Crimes: Crimes that manifest evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the victim's race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity/national origin or disability.

- Clery Act requires addition of "national origin" and "gender identity" to the hate crime categories, involving intentional selection of a victim based on actual or perceived characteristics that must be reported under the Clery Act.

Butte College is required to report statistics for hate (bias) related crimes by the type of bias as defined below for the following classifications: murder/non-negligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, sex offenses (forcible and non-forcible), robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, liquor law violations, drug violations and/or illegal weapons possession and larceny, vandalism, intimidation, and simple assault, and any crimes involving bodily injury to any person.

Larceny: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

Vandalism: To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

Intimidation: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm using threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Simple Assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration or loss of consciousness.

If a hate crime occurs where there is an incident involving intimidation, vandalism, larceny, simple assault or other bodily injury, the law requires that the statistic be reported as a hate crime even though there is no requirement to report the crime classification in any other area of the compliance document.
