Whether you are preparing for a transfer to a four-year college or university, seeking an occupational degree or certificate, or taking classes to improve skills or investigate a new career, we are pleased that you have chosen Butte College. Our staff is committed to providing you with the best education possible.

Services:

- **Pay Fees:** After you register, check your fees in your Self-Service portal. You can pay online through your Self-Service portal or by calling the Support Center at (530) 895-2511. You can also pay in person at the Admissions and Records (A&R) Office on the Main Campus, Chico Center, and Glenn Center
- **Residency:** If you have been classified as a non-resident and you wish to appeal that decision you must complete the Residency Re-evaluation form and submit documentation. If you need assistance, contact the Residency Technician at residency@butte.edu. Butte College welcomes undocumented and mixed immigration status students. Dreamers and undocumented students needing help with California Nonresident tuition waivers (AB540) can contact the Undocucenter for support at 530-895-2817.
- **Request Transcripts:** If you need your official Butte College transcript, you can order it online through the Admissions & Records website or in person at the A&R office on the Main Campus. Unofficial transcripts can be obtained through your Self-Service portal.
- **Enrollment Verifications:** All parties wishing to verify student enrollment can do so online at www.enrollmentverify.org or at the A&R Office on the Main Campus.
- **Degree Verifications:** All parties wishing to verify degree attainment can do so online at www.degreeverify.org or A&R Main Campus
- **Transcript Evaluation:** Transcript evaluations award credit(s) from courses taken at other academic institutions. To have a transcript evaluated students must have an official transcript on file, prior or current Butte College enrollment, and should submit a Transcript Evaluation Request form to evaluations@butte.edu or bring it to the A&R office.
- **Add/Drop Classes:** Log in to your Self-Service student account to add/drop classes
- **Registration:** Visit our website to see when you are eligible to register for classes

Community college is one of the most affordable paths to higher education, but sometimes students still need financial assistance, which is where the Financial Aid office comes in. Both federal and state governments offer numerous financial aid options including grants, scholarships, and loans and it's easy to apply. To explore all of your financial aid options, we encourage you to visit the Financial Aid office in person or virtually through our website, www.butte.edu/financialaid.

Butte College Promise Scholarship Program (BCPS)- Your Future. Butte's Promise.

The Butte College Promise Scholarship will pay up to two academic years of enrollment fees (tuition) and service fees for all Butte College students who are new, first-time, and full-time (including students who earned college units while still in high school). This scholarship is not awarded on the basis of financial need. Students who file a FAFSA or CADAA and complete the financial aid process will automatically be considered for the Butte College Promise Scholarship and do not have to complete a separate application.

How to Apply for Financial Aid:

If you are a US citizen or eligible non-citizen, fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) using school code 006972

- If you are undocumented and meet AB 540 status, file a California Dream Act Application (CADAA) using school code 00807300

YOUR GRADES MATTER!

Students receiving financial aid must meet Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements. This includes maintaining a 2.0 GPA, completing at least 67% of your courses, and staying within 150% of the established maximum timeframe for the students declared program of study. For example, if your program is 60 units, you have a maximum timeframe of 90 units.

Students who do not meet SAP, will receive email notification to your Butte College email from the Financial Aid Office at the end of each term (Fall, Spring & Summer) once grades are finalized. Students can appeal disqualification of financial aid through an appeals process outlined in the email communication.

Stay on track and make sure to meet SAP!

To qualify for the BCPS, students must meet the following criteria:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB 540 student (residency and AB 540 status are determined through Admissions & Records)
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or CA Dream Act application (CADAA) and any mandatory verification requirements
- Enroll in and complete 12 or more units with at least a 2.0 GPA per term

Transfer Counseling Center

At the Transfer Counseling Center (TCC), students receive specialized information and counseling regarding their preparation for applying to a university or college in California or out-of-state. California public universities (CSUs and UCs) require admission applications be submitted electronically nearly a year prior to transferring. Other admission application dates vary by institution. In all cases, it is very important for a student to meet with a counselor well before their anticipated transfer. The TCC strives to make your transfer to the college or university system as smooth and seamless as possible.

Student Health Clinic

The Butte College Student Health Clinic handles a wide range of health-related issues including urgent-care medical treatment, pregnancy prevention/STI checks, health counseling, crisis and personal therapy, and appropriate referrals to community resources. In addition, we also provide educational information to our students and health related events throughout the year.

Services: The Student Health Clinic offers the following services to currently registered students. There is no charge to see the nurse practitioners, physician, or mental health specialist. Some tests, medications and procedures require a minimal fee.

- Evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment for illnesses and injuries. Specialized medical services, minor surgeries, treatment, and referral
- Personal brief therapy offered in English: Therapy services may address high-risk behaviors, alcohol and drug problems, eating disorders, depression, anxiety, PTSD and more
- Dermatology: We treat minor to moderate skin infections, acne, lacerations, mole removals, wart treatments. We can obtain cultures to check for infections
- Orthopedics: We treat strains and sprains and have braces, splints, and crutches available
- Physical Examinations: pre-employment, Police & Fire Academies, Allied Health, and athletes
- Prescriptions: Limited low-cost pharmacy on site. WE DO NOT FILL OUTSIDE PRESCRIPTIONS
- Confidential HIV and other sexually transmitted infection testing, male & female reproductive health exams, and pregnancy testing
- Wellness services include: some immunizations; screening for TB, high cholesterol, high blood pressure, anemia, breast and testicular cancer, diabetes, and other disorders. Labs can be obtained at significant discount to Butte College students at Quest Diagnostics
- Referrals for free STI testing at local FamPact Clinics

In compliance with AB 461, fentanyl testing strips are available to students at the Student Health Clinic at no cost.

Privacy

We adhere to very strict Federal regulations on healthcare privacy (HIPAA). The student's time here is private and confidential. Confidentiality may be broken if the patient poses a danger to self or others.

Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOPS) is a state-funded program that provides special services to eligible students.

Services Provided:

- Priority registration
- Textbook credit
- Academic, vocational, transfer, and personal counseling
- Calculator loan program
- One-to-one tutoring
- Tutor-assisted instruction for selected math courses
- Computer lab with free printing
- Emergency loan program (up to \$300 per year)
- Application fee waiver for CSU or UC systems

What Can an EOPS Counselor Do for You?

- Provide academic, vocational, transfer, and personal counseling
- Assist with the financial aid process
- Assist with class scheduling
- Assist with development of a Student Educational Plan (SEP)
- Assist with graduation applications
- Make referrals to other student services and community agencies as appropriate
- Assist with transfer to CSU/UC, private or out-of-state colleges
- Impart vital information necessary for you to succeed in college

How to Qualify for EOPS:

- Be a California resident or AB 540 student (residency is determined by the Butte College Admissions and Records Office) Be enrolled in 12 units (limited space is available for students in 9-11.75 units and accommodations may be available to students with disabilities)
- Have completed less than 70-degree applicable units
- Meet the income requirement for the California College Promise Grant A or B Meet one of the following educational factors:
 - You did not graduate from high school (General Education Diploma, G.E.D., and High School proficiency are considered high school graduation)
 - You graduated from high school with less than a 2.5 GPA (high school transcripts must be provided to the Butte College EOPS Office)
 - You were previously or are currently enrolled in a basic skills class (courses numbered 200-299)
 - You are a first-generation college student (neither of your biological or adoptive parents were awarded a Bachelor's degree). Your parents are not native English speakers
 - You are a member of an under-represented group as identified in the Butte College Student Equity Plan

Cooperative Agencies for Education (CARE) is a state-funded program to assist EOPS-eligible students with the cost of childcare and other educational expenses while they are attending Butte College. Every CARE student is an EOPS student who must meet the eligibility criteria for both programs.

To be eligible for CARE you must:

- Be a single, head-of-household, one parent family
- Be at least 18 years old
- Receive cash aid for yourself and/or your children (CalWORKs/TANF)

Mathematics Engineering Science Achievement (MESA)

What is MESA? MESA is one of the first programs to assist students in becoming highly trained STEM professionals. Founded in 1970, the program serves underrepresented and educationally and economically disadvantaged students by offering academic support to students pursuing math, engineering, and science degrees. MESA forges a community of learners based upon academic achievement. It acts as a bridge to aid students in making successful transitions in their educational pursuits. Students who participate in the program are more likely to transfer to colleges or universities and major in STEM fields.

- Week Zero: a three-day STEM Academy for new students. Takes place in August.

Academic Criteria

- Intent to transfer to a four-year college or university
- Declared transfer major in a calculus-based STEM area, including engineering, chemistry, biology, physics, math, and computer science
- Educational plan that supports enrollment in a minimum of two sequential courses of calculus and two sequential courses in biology, chemistry, physics, computer science, or engineering
- Students who already have earned a bachelor's degree in any major are NOT eligible

Economically and Educationally Disadvantaged Criteria

- Currently receiving need-based financial aid
- Has a completed FAFSA or California Dream Act application on file at SRJC Neither parent/guardian holds a bachelor's degree
