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**Course Description:** An introduction to political science designed to familiarize students with basic political concepts, political ideologies, political systems, and subfields within political science. (C-ID POLS 150).

#### Examples of Assignments

##### Reading Assignments

1. Read the article from the New York Times about the Crisis in Ukraine. As you read try to make annotations and connections to terms we have discussed in class: sovereignty, democracy, globalization, etc. Be prepared to discuss this reading with peers.
2. Read the article that explains normative and empirical approaches in political science. Be prepared to discuss which approach you favor and why.

### Writing Assignments

1. Write a three-page essay focusing on the amount of money spent in the most recent presidential election by both Super PACs and small individual donors . Review the blog piece by The Monkey Cage that discusses the Citizens United SCOTUS case. Your paper should include citations and 5 key terms from the chapter on elections.
2. Conduct preliminary research on two contemporary issues or problems facing local government in the city that you live in. Create an annotated bibliography of at least 5 newspaper sources published within the last year for each issue or problem.

### Out-of-Class Assignments

1. Attend a meeting of the Diversity and Hiring Committee. Be prepared to summarize the meeting's discussion in our class. Some states have active affirmative action programs while others do not. What is California's current position on affirmative action and what proposals were being advanced by this college with regard to diversity in hiring?
2. Please attend a local government meeting on the topic of housing and homelessness, some are even available via Zoom or recorded. Report your observations to class. Make notes comparing what you heard with the reading from the Sacramento Bee article discussed in class and Governor's speech (see Canvas). Be prepared to discuss with peers.
